MORGAN TOPS TABLE

For the moment at least, John Morgan is in the BBAR driving seat, leading Rowan Horner by a slender 0.161mph in the full three-distance table.

"I'm really chuffed," said the 27-year-old Lancastrian, who afforded himself a free weekend last Saturday and Sunday and will be tackling a couple of 25-mile events in Cheshire — "to try and work some speed back into my legs" — before upping his distance again to 50 and 100 miles.

"The 12-hour frightened me a bit, and so I wanted to get that out of the way as soon as possible, which is why I went for the Elmet," said Morgan, who had not done any

of the BBAR distances prior to last season.

"This really has been a venture into the unknown for me," he admitted. "Last year I did 263 miles in the North Midlands event, so my 275 this time meant I had improved by a mile an hour and I could have gone faster but for a horrible wind towards the end of the day.

"In the '100' I didn't get my pacing quite right. I'm sure I can get my time down by a couple of minutes, and I think I still have room for improvement at 50 miles."

Morgan, who rode his first competitive event in April 2000, admitted: "I'm totally bitten by the bug now."

But despite his early advantage in the individual table, Morgan insists modestly that he is only a team player.

"It's the team that matters most — that's what we [Preston Wheelers] are going for again this year," he explained.

Morgan is confident that, by the time the BBAR competition draws to a halt on September 28, the team will once again be led by Gethin Butler. Butler has — with the exception of 2001 when he was more focused on his Land's End to John o' Groats record bid — finished no lower than fourth in the final rankings since 1990.
